
## A BRIEF HISTORY


The Welsh Parliament, which is called the Senedd, was created to give the people of Wales a stronger voice in decisions about their daily lives.

In 1999, the National Assembly for Wales was set up after a referendum.

In 2020, it became the Welsh Parliament (Senedd Cymru).

Today, the Senedd makes laws and decisions on many issues that directly affect communities in Wales.





# WHO CAN VOTE IN THE SENEDD ELECTIONS ON 7 MAY 2026?

You can vote if you are:

- Registered to vote
- 16 or over on the day of the election ('polling day')
- ✓ Live in Wales
- ✓ Not be legally excluded from voting
- If you're a British citizen, Irish citizen or a citizen of an EU country.
- You can also vote if you're a citizen of another country and have permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or you do not need permission.

## WHY YOUR VOTE MATTERS

The Senedd decides on key issues that affect you, your family and your community, including:

Health and NHS





Examples of devolved policies unique to Wales:

- Free NHS prescriptions for everyone in Wales (not available in England).
- Free school meals for all primary school children
- Lower tuition fees and financial support for Welsh students compared to England.

These are everyday issues that impact your life. Your vote helps shape these decisions.

### A NEW VOTING SYSTEM IN 2026

The next election will be different – every vote will count more than ever.

Wales is introducing Proportional Representation – the number of seats a party wins will reflect the percentage of votes they receive.

✓ The Senedd is also increasing from 60 to 96 members.

#### This means:

- More choice
- Fairer results
- A stronger democracy


# WHY THE 2026 ELECTION IS ESPECIALLY IMPORTANT

This election is historic – especially for refugees and ethnic minority communities.

Your vote can influence policies that affect:

- Access to language support
- Welsh asylum and move on support
- Community cohesion support
- Education opportunities

Policies that support sanctuary seekers and refugees in Wales, will only continue if people use their democratic voice.



### **HOW TO CONTACT MY ELECTED OFFICIAL?**

#### **Know Who Represents You**


- Use tools like Find my Senedd member or your local government website to find your representative.
- Identify which level of government covers your issue (local, regional, national).

#### **Choose How to Reach Out**

- Email or letter best for formal communication and a written record.
- In-person meeting or community forum impactful for relationship building.
- Social media useful for visibility, but be respectful and concise.

#### **Craft Your Message**

- Start with who you are and where you live (they prioritise constituents).
- Explain the issue clearly and briefly.
- Share why it matters to you personal stories resonate.
- Ask for something specific (e.g., "Will you support X policy?"









#### TOP TIPS

- 1. Be polite and professional even if you disagree.
- 2.Keep it short: 2–3 paragraphs is ideal.
- 3. Work with others a shared message from multiple constituents has more impact




## HOW TO VOTE AT A POLLING STATION



## **DO YOUR RESEARCH**

Before you vote, explore what different parties are saying and decide what matters most to you and your family.

Two of the best ways to do this is:

**Read Party Manifestos** – each political party releases a manifesto outlining its policies before the election. These can often be dense, but charities and media outlets sometimes produce simplified guides.

**Local candidates' events** – hustings or Q&A sessions (sometimes run by community groups or churches) allow people to hear directly from candidates.

#### Questions you should think about:

- Which policies affect me and my community most?
- What are the party's positions on housing, jobs, education, healthcare, immigration, and equality?
- Does the party's record match its promises?
